I am delighted to present the Annual Report of Sunaayy Foundation for 2021-22. I take this opportunity to give you an update of all that happened during the year.

A total of 650 children are enrolled in 20 Centres across New Delhi, Kolkata and Bihar. The interventions include education, nutrition and health. In addition, the women from the underprivileged background are actively contributing towards the smooth running of the Centres.

This year, to mitigate the problem of resource divide and learning loss among the rural children during the pandemic, Sunaayy opened new Learning Centres in the remote, rural areas of Bihar, Jharkhand, West Bengal and Uttar Pradesh, reaching out to approximately 225 children.

As always, we extend our sincere gratitude to all individuals, organizations and volunteers for their time and support towards our endeavour to serve the underserved and unreached communities.



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ABOUT US

Sunaayy Foundation is a non-profit organization that was founded in 2009 in Vasant Kunj, New Delhi (India). Sunaayy adopts an issue-based approach to focus on a critical development challenge, namely. Addressing the poor education, health, hygiene, and nourishment outcomes of children from underprivileged and marginalized households.

IMPACT:

- Increased class attendance and improved performances leading to an increased number of children being mainstreamed into formal schools.
- Successful implementation of the Hub and Spoke model leading to professional development of teachers.
- Well trained and motivated teaching leading to centres being opened in remote rural areas.
- Opening new centres made education accessible to children in remote rural areas.
- Reduced economic burden on household and health risk in children.
- Marked improvement in terms of behavioural change in children attending SMART classes.

RURAL ENDEAVOUR

The COVID 19 pandemic adversely affected the education system forcing learners to transition to e-learning, the "new normal". However, this transition was not possible for all learners, especially from rural India. Sunaayy, to mitigate this problem, as a new initiative decided to set up education Centres, and start teaching children in rural areas of Bihar, Jharkhand, West Bengal and Uttar Pradesh.

The resource divide for the children living in villages had left a huge gap; Lack of access to the internet and low education level of their parents to guide their children through tech aided education exacerbated the situation. The team Sunaayy worked towards putting together resources for children in rural areas, making the world a little more accessible through teaching and helping them grow.





CENTERS

DARBHANGA CENTER Bihar (2021)

Sunaayy took the initiative to start a new centre at Darbhanga, one of the remote areas in Bihar where education is the least priority. The team met the villagers and put forth their ideas of setting up a learning centre. The villagers expressed keen interest and with the support of the local community, the centre was set up, at Darbhanga, on 7th April 2021 and has been running successfully.

The children at the centre are from neighbouring villages and are often neglected as both parents work as migrant labours. One of Sunaay's teacher, Ms. Puja Kumari, a migrant from Bihar, played a major role in it. She is one of the finest teachers of the Sunaayy Foundation and has been teaching since the past 5 years.

Ms Puja Kumari, took the leadership training, last year, at the Foundation and with the help of a local contact, she started classes, at her own village. Her knowledge in technology enabled her to manage the classes from Delhi virtually.

On her visit to the Centre on 24th April 2021, Ms Rakhi Kumari, Centre Supervisor informed her about the lack of resources for education materials. Ms Kumari, took steps and in the last week of June distributed stationery kits to these underprivileged children. Each kit contained pens, pencils, sharpener, eraser etc.

The children were really excited to receive these stationery kits. It was heart-warming to see children who have never held a pen before eager to start writing.

Ms. Rakhi Kumari managed this entire Centre alone, till May 2021 with the support and coordination from the Sunaayy, team, Delhi. Later, Ms. Bibha joined and helped Sunaayy to run the Centre. Sunaayy, during the trial period between April 2021 to September 2021, received an amazing response from the students and their parents. A lot of progress has been made at the Centre from September 2021 till date.

On 26th November and 19th December 2021, Sunaayy team visited the Centre and distributed education materials, sweaters, caps etc. which made both children and parents very happy.

The number of children increased at the Centre in a very short span of time. Initially it opened its door with just 25-30 students however in the month of December, the number of students increased to around 70-75 between the age group of 4 to 14 years. There were 57 students in February 2022 and 60 in March 2022. The teachers are well trained and experienced.

DIKDON CENTRE, Jharkhand (2021)

The Sunaayy team conducted a survey at Ranchi, Jharkhand, from 5th to 9th April to identify a village to set up a Learning Centre. The team felt the need and decided on village Dikdon. The children at the village, though, went to school during the day but went for tuitions in the evening. They barely studied at home, as parents being uneducated were unable to give proper guidance. At home the children either played, helped in household chores or did petty jobs. The parents expressed the need for more regular classes.

Ms Richa Prasant, Founder-Secretary, Sunaayy visited Jharkhand on 2nd October 2021, to inaugurate the new Centre. She was accompanied by Lalita, a teacher of Sunaayy, who has her own house in the village. Lalita had already talked to the villagers on running a Centre. The villagers agreed to support and a Community Hall was provided, free of cost. At the opening of the Centre, sweets were distributed among the children and parents.

Next day, approximately 55 students came with their parents to enroll themselves. A new computer with internet connection was installed to benefit more students. The villagers were elated with this new initiative.

The Centre has two teachers and one volunteer named, Ms Anupa Minj and Mr Abhay Singh, Ms Kiran Devi (Volunteer), they live in Jharkhand to take care of the Centre. Ms Lalita (teacher) coordinates with them from Delhi. At present there are 70 students. The Villagers extend their support and help from time to time.

On 9th January 2022, Sunaayy organized a picnic for the children of the Centre. One of the villagers, Lalit Kumar, arranged for a music system. Ms Kiran Devi provided 15 kg of rice and other food items were purchased by teachers. The teachers cooked food themselves and had lunch together with the children. The children enjoyed the outing thoroughly as it was the first time they went on a picnic.

HARDOI CENTRE, Uttar Pradesh (2021)

A new Centre at Hardoi, Uttar Pradesh was inaugurated on 21st May 2021. There was an urgent need to set up a Centre as the area lacked schools and the children were less motivated and inclined towards education. They either helped with the household chores or were into petty jobs to keep themselves occupied.

The new Centre gave them the much-needed opportunity to avail better education. The number of students gradually increased from 15 to 50. There are two teachers.

Ms Richa Prasant, FounderSecretary, Sunaay, visited the Hardoi centre on the 19th of June 2021. The lockdown was a setback, with students losing interest at times however, the teachers took the opportunity and equipped themselves better in managing online classes and were able to sustain the interest of the students. The students attend their classes with great enthusiasm.







CHITTOYI CENTRE, West Bengal (2021)

During the COVID 19 lockdown Ms Richa Prasant decided to begin English classes for teachers with Nexconnect. The teachers learnt and improved their English to take classes.

On 6th April 2022, two teachers Sakshi and Nazirul, started teaching English online to the children in the villages of Chittoyi, West Bengal. The children are very happy with this new way of learning and are studying English with a lot of interest.





SITAMARHI Bihar (2021)

Sitamarhi is a district in Bihar, a state of India. It has a population, more than 300,000. More than 70% of the people live below the poverty line. Their main occupation is Farming.

The children between the ages of 5 to 15 years are engaged in domestic and farming work with their parents. Due to illiteracy and lack of awareness child marriage is prevalent. Education for them is a distant dream. Though the Government has set up formal schools but they are very far from home and school timing does not suit them. Thus, education was a low priority.

Ms Puja Kumari, a teacher from Sunaayy who belongs to Bihar, had a dream to open a small school, especially in rural or remote areas of Bihar. When she visited her village, she would see no change. The children played in unhygienic conditions and were suffering from malnutrition. She then decided to open one more centre in Bihar. However before going ahead, she arranged a meeting with the parents and their children to understand their perspectives towards education. She generated awareness on the importance of education and how it could be a changemaker. The parents agreed to send their children to the Learning Centre.

On 7th December 2021 Sunaayy Foundation opened a new Center at Blaha village, Sitamarhi with 30 students. The Centre was first run as a pilot project to see children and their parents' responses. After positive feedback from Ms Gunja, the Centre teacher, Sunaayy finally approved the Centre. Sunaayy has distributed sweaters and education materials among the children. The teachers at Delhi also communicate with them from time to time with the help of modern devices. Children are studying with full of enthusiasm and excitement.



EVENTS

SNACKS DISTRIBUTION:

Mrs Anshu Bhatiya, one of Sunaay's donors, has been regularly distributing food among the children but was disrupted due to the lockdown. However, after the lockdown period, on 3rd April 2021, she brought food packets for almost 200 children at the Dairy and Bandu Camp Centre. Each packet contained a burger, sandwich, cupcake, a frooti and chocolate. The children were very happy to receive the packets.



FOOD DISTRIBUTION:

Ms. Richa Prasant, Director Sunaayy Foundation, lost her father and the Chairman of the Foundation, Mr. Prashant Kumar Sen, who bonded Sunaayy Foundation together. He left us with a legacy of courage, hard work, conviction, undying faith and kindness.

After recovering from her grief, on 12th May 2021, Ms Richa Prasant distributed freshly cooked food packets to 450 children of four centres at Delhi ie. Jai Hind Camp, Masoodpur Dairy, Bandhu Camp and Kishangarh. Simultaneously, a memorial service was organised virtually for everyone to mourn the immense loss.



LUNCH FOR STAFF AND DISTRIBUTION:

Mr. Rajesh Chowdhary who has been with Sunaayy since past 5 years and is a major donor, on 14th July 2021 distributed cakes, biscuits and some dry ration at Kishangarh Centre to more than 200 children. Later, he arranged lunch for the staff at JW Marriott Hotel. It was a memorable day.







SANITARY NAPKIN DISTRIBUTION:

On 26th July, 2021, Sunaayy organized an awareness program on menstrual hygiene management.

Mrs. Anita Jain, District Chairperson of Inner club Vasant Kunj, distributed sanitary napkins to almost 300 young girls and women.



ANNUAL DAY:

On 4th August 2021, Sunaayy Foundation celebrated its Annual Day. Sanitizers, masks and Maggie was distributed among 500 students. After the distribution, all staff went for lunch at Oodles Hotel. Everyone shared their journey with Sunaayy and paid tribute to the former Chairman Late Mr Prashant Kumar Sen. At the end, the new chairman Mr. Anirban Chakraborty delivered his speech.



SCIENCE PROJECT SESSION:

A Science project session was held on 14th August, 2021 for the students aged between 13 to 18 years. The students learnt various experiments and show-cased their talent, creativity and innovation. The science project session was held as part of the Independence Day Celebration. Mr. Aman, the organizer of the event conducted many fun activities with the children and also guided them. The children had a lot of fun and learnt many experiments.







COOKED FOOD DISTRIBUTION:

On 13th, 14th and 15th August, on the occasion of Independence Day, Food for The Hungry, the oldest and trusted associate of Sunaayy organised a food distribution drive providing cooked food to 500 children at Bandhu Camp, Kishangarh, Mahipalpur and Dairy Centre.; The food included Daal-rice and biscuits.

BISCUIT DISTRIBUTION:

On 27th August 2021, Mr Navneet sent 450 packets of biscuits for distribution. Sunaayy distributed the biscuits to 500 children in 5 centres, Bandhu Camp, Kishangarh, Mahipalpur, Dairy and Palam.

TEACHERS DAY CELEBRATION:

On 4th and 5th September 2021, Next-Connect organized a one-hour Teachers Day programme, in which children who were attending online classes, participated.

The children introduced themselves, conveyed their wishes for each of their favourite teachers and also displayed greeting cards they had created. A few children also recited poems and dedicated special songs to the teachers.

Another similar virtual Teachers Day programme was organized by Nex-Connect for both the Children and the Teachers. The teachers introduced themselves and shared their journey and experience of working with Sunaayy Foundation. Ms. Shoma Sarkar, Ms. Arina from Nex-Connect and Mr. Sayan from the United States. Ms. Richa Prasant the Founder Secretary of Sunaayy Foundation also shared her own experience of working with the teachers.

Later, as part of Teachers Day celebration, a get-together was organized at Sunaayy's office. Each teacher received a Samsung Tab from Mr. Neeraj Prakash, to help and enable them conduct online classes effectively and ease from their homes.

The teachers were equally excited to receive the tabs.





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NIGHT SUIT DISTRIBUTION:

On 22nd September 2021, one of Sunaayy Foundation donors, Mr. Rajesh Chowdhary came with his daughter, Ms. Ashmita Chowdhary and friend at Sunaayy's office to celebrate his birthday with the children. They distributed 40 night suits among the students. The students played games and danced. The teachers too participated in the celebration. Later biscuits were distributed among the students.



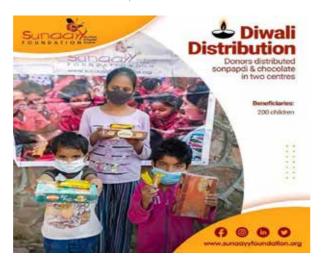
FLOUR DISTRIBUTION:

On 19th November 2021, a flour distribution program was organized at all Centres in Delhi. It was sponsored by the Round Table. 500kg flour was distributed among the students. Each student got a 5kg flour bag. This dry ration was distributed after a long gap.



DIWALI DISTRIBUTION:

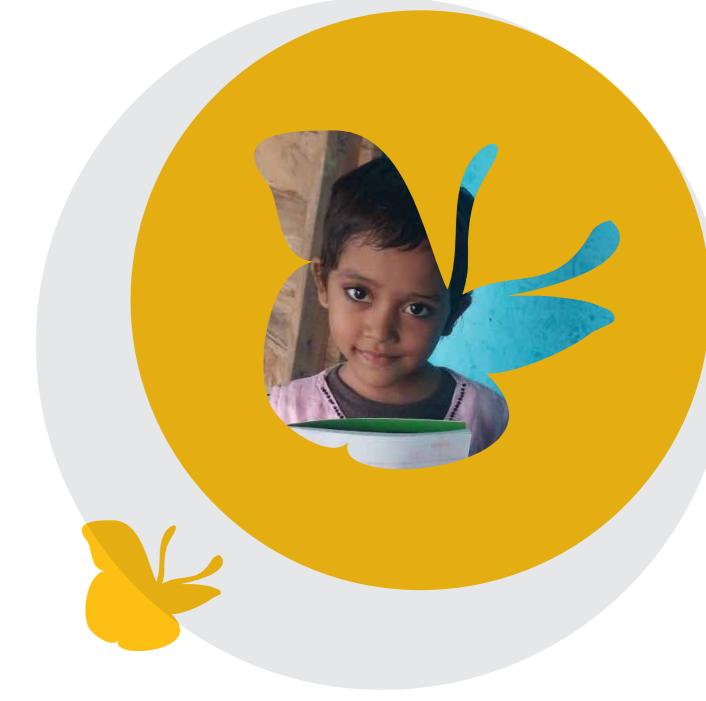
TOn 2nd and 3rd October 2021, a day before Diwali, a distribution program was organized at all centres. It was sponsored by Sunaayy's regular donors. Donors distributed 100kg Sonpapri and 400 chocolates amongst 200 Kids at the two centres Bandhu camp, Kisangarh and another donor distributed 300 food packets at Rangpuri, Bengali Basti and Dairy centre. Food packets included Biscuit, chocolate, chips, Frooti and Namkeen.



GIFTS DISTRIBUTION:

The Rotaract Club, Bombay MidTown requested Sunaayy to organize an interactive session with the students. On 28th December 2021, an online session was conducted and approximately 50 members of Sunaayy including teacher staff and students, attended the session. The students introduced themselves and showcased their talents in singing, dancing, painting, etc. They also played mind games, verbal puzzles, and general knowledge quizzes.

On 12th January 2022, the Rotaract Club, Bombay MidTown sent a package of stationeries which was distributed among the students, who participated in the online session.







BLANKET DISTRIBUTION:

On 1st February 2022, Sunaayy organized a blanket distribution program only at the Delhi's Centres. It was sponsored by Round Table and CII-YI (Young India). They sent 500 and 175 blankets to Sunaayy respectively. 135 blankets were distributed at the Dairy center, 50 at the Palam center, 65 at Rangpuri center, 50 at Mahipalpur centre, 55 at Kishangarh center, 70 at Bengali Basti Center and 100 blankets at Bandhu Camp centre. The extra blankets were distributed among the needy people.





SNACKS DISTRIBUTION:

On 13th February 2022 Mrs. Neha Malik, with her son came to the Dairy Camp Centre to celebrate his birthday with the children. Approximately 100 children were given Frooti, samosas and cookies.





SCHOOL BAG DISTRIBUTION:

On 30th March 2022, Mr Himanshu Singh, a donor of Sunaayy distributed school bags at Mandir centre. The school bags included a notebook, geometry and lunch box.

The other events included activity classes for teachers by Ms Anita Hanloi on the occasion of World Television Day, World Hello Day and World Tsunami Day. She also generated awareness on Cancer.

OPENING OF THE CENTRE:

After two years, the Sunaayy center reopened on 16th February 2022. In the past two years many new initiatives were introduced: One was the teachers were provided with Tablet. After learning the technology, they were able to take online classes and stayed connected with the children. However, it was difficult to connect with some children. The children were extremely happy coming to the centers. Sunaayy arranged for breakfast and lunch was served as earlier.











CASE STUDIES

STORY OF NIKHIL (Dikdon Centre, Jharkhand)

Nikhil, 8 years, is a sincere and hardworking student studying in level I at the Dikdon Centre. He is from a poor economic background and lives with his poor parents and three siblings in a dilapidated hut. Nikhil has speech impairment since childhood and stammers while he speaks. Due to this impairment, he was denied admissions in schools including Government run schools.

However, when the Dikdon Centre opened, Nikhil started attending classes regularly. The teacher at the Centre understood his problem and with great care and affection nurtured Nikhil. He gradually gained confidence and soon was able to learn the Alphabets, Varnamala and Counting from 1 to 100.

His parents are overwhelmed with his progress and are grateful to Sunaayy for providing him the opportunity to study.

In Mr. Vijay's (Teacher) words" In the beginning, it was very difficult as we were unable to understand Nikhil's words but gradually, we developed friendship with him, he shares and communicates with us and now we can understand him better..."



STORY OF JAID (Dairy Centre)

Jaid, a 12 years old boy, has been a student of Dairy Centre of Sunaayy Foundation for the past 2 years. He is in the same school where his two younger sisters attend classes. The Sunaayy team found them loitering in a park, one day, wearing torn clothes. The team met the parents and briefed them about Sunaayy's education program. Soon they were enrolled in the Dairy Centre and have been attending classes regularly.

Jaid belongs to a family with a low economic background. His mother works as a domestic help while his father runs a seasonal vegetable stall, at the market. The monthly income barely covers their daily needs. Sunaayy reached out to the family and provided groceries, clothing, education material, free health check-ups and financial assistance as when required to tide them over their difficult times

Jaid's parents are very happy. They want their son to continue with his studies, be a doctor and serve the under-privileged community.
