For the past 13 years, the Sunaayy Foundation has dedicated its efforts to cultivating a world where empowered, creative, and vibrant children thrive, their rights upheld and respected within a society founded on dignity, justice, and equality for everyone. Sunaayy Foundation is committed to fostering comprehensive growth among youth, children, and women in these regions, employing a range of diverse intervention methods. Presently, Sunaayy Foundation has extended its impact across New Delhi, Bihar, Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh, and West Bengal, employing innovative strategies that have facilitated the provision of the following services:

### **EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE:**

- Establishing Teaching and learning centers where Sunaayy Human Welfare Foundation's staff, students, and community members work in a collaborative environment to create rich, engaged learning and teaching experiences.
- Ensuring access to elementary and quality education for underserved children both in rural and urban area.
- Providing remedial classes to under-privileged children of Government Schools experiencing difficulties in their studies.
- · Aiming to reduce the number of drop out through mainstreaming children into formal schools.

### **ENHANCING DIGITAL LITERACY:**

- Mitigating learning gap through "Dual Teacher Model" where a group of experienced teachers connect with the underprivileged children online/live using Online Learning Platform.
- Integrating technology more effectively into teaching practice through enhancing digital literacy among teachers.

### **NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT:**

- Regular hot meals improved health status of children
- Ensuring accessibility of food to the 500 children. Nearly 200, 000 meals served.
- · Addressing the nutritional contents to students and adolescents by giving nutritional support.

### SKILL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME:

- Recruiting teachers from the community and women who couldn't complete their education are preferred.
- Providing sessions such as Spoken English and digital literacy to upgrade their skills.
- Developing leadership capacity and expertise in staff and teachers.
- Providing hands-on experience that makes it realistic for teachers to translate training experiences into class-room practice.
- Imparting training to teachers in student and parent counselling on several issues like gender discrimination, substance abuse, child labour, etc.

### PROMOTING LIVELIHOOD:

• Recruiting teachers from the community who are mostly women which helps them in reviving their learning and also a platform to earn their living which endure their financial independence.

### GENDER EQUALITY AND PREVENTION OF GENDER -BASED VIOLENCE

- Removing discrimination by ensuring equal access to education for both girls and boys in the centres.
- Organizing workshops and awareness camps to promote conversation about child and women rights.

### **WOMEN EMPOWERMENT:**

- Helping women participate and providing equal opportunities to women to earn their living and support their families which boost up their confidence and help them become financially able.
- Enabling these women to make informed choices about their life and break the stereotypes of gender norms and roles in their native societies
- Creating women community leaders who got inspired to help underserved children from their own community and started learning centers in their native villages of U.P, Bihar and Jharkhand.

#### **COMMUNITY OWNERSHIP:**

- Recruiting teachers from same localities as the children to invoke a sense of responsibility, attachment, bonding, and nurturing qualities.
- The Teaching & Learning Development Centre (TLDC) is intended as a space where Sunaayy Human Welfare Foundation's staff, students, and community members work in a collaborative environment to create rich, engaged learning and teaching experiences.

### INNOVATIVE STRATEGY TO GENERATE AWARENESS ON RELEVANT ISSUES:

- Organizing online training session on working and spoken English for both children and teachers.
- On one hand it has enhanced the skills of the beneficiaries in English which is essential for their future prospect.
- Another major objective of these sessions is to generate conversation about child rights, women rights, environmental issues and gender discrimination.



### BANDHU CAMP'S RESILIENCE AND RENEWAL AFTER LOCKDOWN:

Bandhu Camp, being one of the oldest centers of the Sunaayy Foundation, continues to operate with a sole focus on addressing the educational and nutritional needs of children. Following the reopening of the centers, teachers played a pivotal role by actively engaging in outreach efforts. They scoured various regions, identifying youngsters, many of whom were engaged in un-legitimate work, such as roadside begging or laboring at nearby dhabas. The teachers not only spoke with these children but also provided them with the opportunity to enroll in the Sunaayy Welfare Foundation. Emphasizing the assurance of regular meals and



essential items, Sunaayy became a beacon of hope for these vulnerable youngsters, resulting in the enrollment of several new students.

Within the Bandhu center, numerous children who hadn't secured admission in any school were welcomed with free education and nutritious meals before the summer vacation. The students received colorful surprises, including toys or stationery, fostering a positive and inclusive learning environment. Both students and instructors exhibited dedication and punctuality in their daily routines, engaging in various activities and enjoying each other's company. The classes were not only characterized by educational activities but also by cleanliness and discipline, managed diligently by the teachers. The children developed a strong fondness for these sessions, expressing a desire to continue attending even during summer vacations. Despite concerns about food supply, the unwavering support of donors and the foundation's commitment to meeting the children's needs ensured the continued success of the Bandhu Camp center.

The impact of these efforts is evident in the positive engagement of the students, who carry fond memories of their first day back in school after the summer break. In the words of Barbara Colorose, "the importance of our role becomes even more pronounced when children don't come from strong, healthy, functioning families". Sunaayy Foundation's dedication to providing a supportive environment and addressing the unique challenges these children face highlights the profound impact they have on their lives.

## JOURNEY OF TRIUMPH: SUNAAYY FOUNDATION'S SUCCESS AT THE DAIRY CENTRE FROM INCEPTION TO THE SUMMER OF 2022:

The Dairy Center, inaugurated on August 4, 2015, stands as one of the longstanding establishments of Sunaayy, situated near the Jain Temple in Masoodpur. The center's early days were marked by numerous challenges, particularly in securing a stable studying space. Initially initiated in a park, it faced opposition from residents who perceived it as mere show. Despite transient locations, the center persevered, witnessing a gradual increase in the number of attending children from 50 to 100, and eventually reaching 135. Many students who began their education here successfully transitioned to formal schools. At present, the center hosts a minimum of 70-75 children. Initially providing modest refreshments, Sunaayy's essence gained recognition, attracting support from donors and the Sunaayy Welfare Foundation, which distributed stationery, blankets, sweaters, caps, and more among the children. Partnerships, such as the one with PTC for a year, exemplify the collaborative efforts. Over time, the center evolved to incorporate not only effective study arrangements but also scheduled breakfast and lunch intervals. Amid the challenges posed by the pandemic, teachers underwent training via Zoom to adapt to the new normal, facilitating regular one-hour online classes.

Even during the lockdown, essential rations were arranged safely for the students' households. Despite disruptions, the Dairy Center resumed its operations, welcoming back eager students. Some individuals, reliant on the Foundation for sustenance, expressed a desire for classes to continue even during the summer vacation, demonstrating the profound impact and significance of Sunaayy's ongoing efforts.





**EMPOWERING EDUCATORS:** Teacher's Training during Sunaayy Summer Camp: During the summer camp organized by Sunaayy Welfare Foundation, an essential component was the teacher's training classes conducted between Delhi center teachers and village center teachers. These classes, held regularly from Monday to Friday between 11:00 am to 12:00 pm, aimed to enhance the teaching skills of Sunaavy's educators for Level 0 and Level 1 students. Throughout the week (May 21, 2022, to May 28, 2022), all teachers actively participated, taking turns to showcase their teaching methods as they do in their regular classes. The focus during the sessions was on Level 0 students, who are at a basic learning stage. The teachers collectively concluded that, for these students, the emphasis should be on teaching fundamental lines and shapes through oral methods. Concepts like Varnamala, counting (1-10), and Alphabets were introduced using visual aids such as pictures and 3D models. Activities, including singing rhymes in Hindi and English, played a vital role in engaging these young learners. After the village center teachers presented their teaching approaches, the Delhi center teachers followed suit, maintaining consistency in the syllabus. A key aspect discussed for Level 1 students was the revision of Level O syllabus, highlighting the difference between small and capital letters. The completion of oral and written alphabets, counting (1-10), and Varnamala was stressed, employing various patterns and matching exercis-

es. Each class session concluded with a discussion on understanding and addressing any mistakes made during the session. This collaborative effort aimed to refine teaching methodologies and ensure effective education for Sunaayy's diverse student base.



**ACTIVITY CLASS REPORT:** Sunaayy Foundation, with its extensive experience in education, prioritizes creative and innovative approaches over traditional lectures for children with no exposure to formal learning. Through engaging activities like drawing on square cardboard, the foundation not only imparts hands-on art and craft experience but also facilitates conceptual learning through visualization. A unique strategy involves enrolling very young children and encouraging elder siblings to bring their younger counterparts, fostering school-like environment in level 0. Recreational activities, observed in the Dairy center, emphasize group cooperation and prepare children for future schooling. Sunaayy Foundation also focuses on extracurricular activities, organizing regular drawing classes and showcasing children's talents through enchanting artwork displays. Addressing environmental concerns, the foundation promotes waste management awareness, involving senior students in creating dustbins from recycled materials and educating children on responsible waste disposal. Suna-



ayy Foundation strives to provide a holistic and enriching child-hood experience for disadvantaged children, encompassing e d u c a t i o n, creativity, and environmental consciousness.

## POST-LOCKDOWN ASSESSMENT OF BENGALI BASTI: A RENEWED OUTLOOK:

During the lockdown, some Sunaayy teaching centers, including the one in Bengali Basti, had to temporarily shut down. Despite attempts at online classes, challenges persisted in the slum areas. On June 21, teachers Sandhya, Shabana, and Sapna conducted a survey in Bengali Basti, marking an emotional reunion after the prolonged separation. Sunaayy Welfare Foundation, beyond providing fundamental education, has been a comprehensive support system during the pandemic, offering mid-day meals, ration distribution, and ensuring community safety. Bengali Basti heavily relies on the foundation for education, awareness about government rules, and essential supplies. Parents eagerly await the center's reopening as their daily occupations leave little time for family and self. Sunaayy Foundation remains a beacon of hope, offering a realistic and achievable tomorrow for the community, sustained by collective efforts and the Foundation's unwavering commitment.

### THE HOSPITALITY LEARNING PROGRAMME AT KOLKATA

The Hospitality program started on 21 June 2022 with 7 women, under the banner of Sunaayy Human Welfare Foundation (SHWF). The holistic program has encompassed three days a week of hands-on kitchen training where women learned the basics of baking and cooking.

**HOLISTIC DEVELOPMENT APPROACH:** At the program onset, the main objective was working in teams and building trust, introduction to kitchen equipment and reading recipes. In the first month, the women were introduced to the kitchen equipment, units of measurement, new food items, and how to read a recipe with photos in English and Bengali (based on language proficiency). They learned their way around the kitchen and how to use professional grade equipment for cooking.

After being comfortable with the kitchen and





a few recipes the women were encouraged to prepare recipes on their own in pairs, where one read out the recipe and the other executed. Their confidence and skills enhanced tenfold as they began to have more hands-on experience and executing recipes on their own.

The women honed skills on specific recipes with the goal of serving small group of people for sit down meal. The women were required to speak with guests, present the food, and explain what was served. They also fielded questions from the guests and shared about their experiences in the program. The women planned, executed and served 100 people for the Learning Centre's inauguration ceremony. Midway assessment activity using skills through 3-day baking adventure was carried out. The women went on a three-day baking adventure which incorporated skills from kitchen, math, computers, and English.

The project activities also includes honing skills and finessing recipes with adaptations to recipes they are familiar with and creating full plates of food as a cohesive meal. The women also went on a one-day navigational city adventure. They had to use Google maps to reach a designated point, observe and use landmarks to get acquainted with the city, use online payment at a food stall, manage ordering food for the group and navigate back. This was a step outside of comfort zones for some.

As part of the kitchen training programme, the women also have experienced short life skills sessions on various aspects of life. For example, they have acquired relevant knowledge on stress management. They also learnt

several aspects of teamwork and building trust within a team and how to value all people contributing to the outcome. The women are delighted to have such a wonderful experience as they can reside in a safe place for sharing share their agony and suffering and they have become successful in building some trustworthy relationships. As part of the kitchen program, the women have also learnt and are still practicing composting with kitchen wastes.

Through this exceptional endeavor the women are reported to learn new things and are able to boost their confidence after overcoming fear and vacillation. The journey has begun with "I can't" and now it has become "I 'will try".



### CHERISHED MOMENTS: CREATING BEAUTIFUL MEMORIES WITH USA VOLUNTEERS:

A heartwarming connection blossomed between teachers and students at the foundation, transcending traditional academic boundaries. A delightful episode unfolded on July 14th, 18th, and 19th, 2022, as special guests from the USA — Neil, Tiya, and Ananya — joined as volunteers, infusing fresh perspectives into the learning environment. Beyond academic pursuits, these days became a celebration of friendship, marked by shared games, yoga sessions, dances, and mutual assistance during rain showers. The cultural exchange enriched the experience, culminating in a joint celebration of the foundation day. The joyous occasion etched lasting memories, evident in the radiant smiles captured in the shared images, a testament to the enduring strength and pride of everyone associated with the Foundation.

In Ananya's word-"As a whole, the experience was touching, and it allowed me a glimpse into a new world of people who don't have the same privileges I do. It was incredible to see the drive and determination these kids have to get a good education, despite all of the factors holding them back. Over the course of the day, I developed a certain admiration for all the kids and the teachers and staff at Sunaayy - I will definitely be going back to volunteer on my next trip to Delhi. In the meantime, I'll do things to support Sunaayy from NYC, such as fundraising, spreading awareness, and promoting the non-profit in my school."







# 13th Annual Day Celebration of Sunaayy Foundation:

Sunaayy Foundation, a non-profit organization dedicated to education, marked its 13th anniversary with a joyous Foundation Day celebration at the Community Hall. Over the years, the foundation has made significant strides in achieving its educational mission. The day was filled with excitement as the Sunaayy team and students gathered for festivities. The children, eager with curiosity, enjoyed a day of happiness and fun, actively participating in dance and song performances prepared in advance. The celebration commenced at the teacher's center and later moved to the community center, engaging nearly 300 enthusiastic children. Alongside the vibrant entertainment, the children were treated to a meal of puri, sabzi, and halwa, enhancing the festive spirit. Special guests added to the joy, and the day concluded with the distribution of treats, including frooti, samosas, bread pakoras, chocolates, and stationery items, fostering a friendly bond between teachers and students. ### FREE EYE CHECK UP CAMP FOR THE CHILDREN

On 6th August, 2022, an free eye check-up for Sunaayy's staff and students was organized which was sponsored by Mrs .Anuu Jain on the occasion of her son's birthday at community hall recreational centre, Vasant Kunj . As the venue is located in close vicinity of Mandir Center and Dairy Center, children along with their parents from these centers were taken to the camp for routine check-up.

The community centre was organized beforehand by Sunaayy staff members for the camp. 300 children were lined up according to their age. The entire programme was held in two phases. In the first phase general informa-

tion like name, age, weight, etc was recorded and in the next phase eye check up of the students were carried out by expert team of doctors to address different vision related troubles. A small lecture was delivered to parents regarding eye care of the children by the team of doctors. After that spectacles were distributed among the needy students. This was followed by distribution of medicine for de-worming among the students and staff members of Sunaayy Foundation. The team distributed the medicine among the children with consent of their parents to ensure their safety.

This initiative of Sunaayy Foundation, to ensure physical well being the students has been really exceptional as parents who are mostly migrant or daily wage labour neither have time or proper awareness nor have financial strength for regular check up of their children. As an obvious consequence often their diseases are left untreated which may have intricate implications on their health. Sunaayy Foundation backed by its volunteers and donors has become successful in providing basic treatment facilities to the children to ensure their physical well being which is a requisite for a healthy and prosperous future.



On the auspicious date of 15th August, our hearts swell with pride as we commemorate the day when our nation gained its hard-fought independence. This celebration becomes a time to nurture special bonds with children, sharing poignant stories of sacrifice that shaped India's freedom, inspiring them with the valor of our national heroes. The collaborative efforts of the Sunaayy Welfare Foundation team enabled the delivery of these simple yet joyous treats, turning them into celebratory moments for the children, irrespective of their birthdays.





#### DIWALI CELEBRATION: MINGLING WITH OUR CULTURE

Festivals are considered as an integral part of our society and culture. On one hand celebration of different festivals can be considered as a gateway for common people to overcome the boredom of mundane life. Beside that the religious essence and historical background associated with each festival act as a bridge between us and our rich cultural heritage. Apart from formal education a child also needs to know about cultural and historical background of his or her country to ensure holistic development as a human being.

Sunaayy Human Welfare Foundation, aspiring to provide educational assistance to under privileged children of migrant labors located at different slums of Delhi has also taken initiative to make these children aware about

our culture and heritage through celebrating Dewali in the learning centers. Apart of disseminating knowledge, this exceptional endeavor has also made the children delighted and happy as most of them are deprived of this bliss of life.

The children from Mandir and Dairy centre came together to celebrate an eco-friendly Diwali for two days along with the staff of Sunaayy Foundation. To provide the actual essence of Diwali, new clothes and diyas were distributed, donated by some kind- hearted donors among the children so that they can wear new dresses on the day of the celebration. On the first day of the celebration samosas, burgers, chips, chocolates and lunch boxes full of sweets were distributed among them with the help of contributions from the donors followed by a fulfilling lunch with puri, sabzi and halwa. The teachers and the support staffs also received amazing gifts on this holy occasion as a token of appreciation of their hard work and effort to provide every possible assistance to those children.

The celebration for the second day started with payer followed by distribution of snacks. An awareness programme was organized to make children understand about significance of celebrating an eco-friendly diwali and the children took an oath to avoid bursting fire crackers. The children decorated the hall with the diays beautifully and prepared greetings card to express their gratitude towards the donors for wonderful gifts. The children were overwhelmed by the celebration as the lights of diyas reflected in their eyes as sparkle of contentment.

## EMPOWERING LIVES: FOOD AND STATIONERY DISTRIBUTION BY SUNABOLY FOUNDATION

During the winter season, the capital city of Delhi faces increased challenges, particularly in urban slum areas like Vasant Kunj, where basic amenities are often lacking. The program brought immense joy to approximately 100 children, who expressed gratitude for the thoughtful gesture. Sunaayy extends special thanks to Geeta Ma'am for her ongoing support and commitment to making a positive impact on the lives of the underprivileged.

To bring joy and variety to the daily meals of the children at the Mandir center, Sunaayy Foundation organized a special noodles distribution on February 13, 2023. Understanding the financial constraints faced by these children and their families, Sunaayy strives to provide diverse and enjoyable food experiences. A total of 100 packets of noodles were distributed, covering students from Level 0 to Level 5. The distribution was executed smoothly, ensuring that every child received a packet of noodles. This thoughtful initiative not only contributed to the nutritional well-being of the children but also brought immense happiness to their faces. Sunaayy Foundation remains dedicated to creating moments of joy and fulfillment for the underprivileged children it serves.

Mrs. Zeenath Palmer along with her ex-student Ritwik Tamang founded an NGO- Asharika Foundation to provide assistance to the children of tea garden labors in Rangbul, Balasun and Toomsoong .These tea estates are placed very remotely in the hills and are restrained by lack of proper transportation. These tea gardens are almost shut down and with the closure, the nominal services that has been provided to the labors like medical facilities, educational assistance to the children has also disappeared eventually. After losing the only source of income, the parents become busy in looking for other livelihood options. Acute financial crises, closure of school adjacent to tea garden and poor communication have compelled their children to discontinue their education and on the other hand they are deprived of basic health facilities. Due to the prevalence of substance abuse among the parents, these children are unable to avail basic facilities like education or nutritious food. In such adverse situation, Aasharika Foundation has appeared as a ray of hope in their life and started day care centers in these tea gardens to conduct classes and provide midday meal in the weekends.

As Sunaayy Foundation visualizes a world with happy, healthy and creative children whose rights are protected and honoured in a society that is built on respect for dignity, justice and equity for all, the organization took a prompt step to work in collaboration with Asharika Foundation to cater the basic needs of those children like education, food, health, who are struggling to survive in extreme condition in such a tender age from September , 2022.

On 16th March, 2023, a team from Sunaayy Foundation, who are working in a partnership with Asharika Foundation to help these distressed family specifically children, paid a visit to these tea gardens and had a personal conversation with the families. They also had some discussion with the teachers. During the visit the team from Sunaayy Foundation distributed some stationery like pencil, copies, sweaters etc. They also participated in preparation and distribution of mid day meal among the 50 children. During the visit team from Sunaayy Foundation were able to build a relationship of empathy and they opened their heart to them. The families accepted them as a part of their struggle and shared their agony. The children conveyed their heartfelt gratitude for their contribution to make their like easier, through their elated broad smile.

## SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICY & NOTES ON ACCOUNTS

A registered Trust, SUNAAY HUMAN WELFARE FOUNDATION began its journey in 2009 with the mission for providing high-quality holistic education to children, vulnerable women, orphans and widows of impoverished families to enable community transformation. As a part of its programme and projects, all beneficiaries, have access to support programmes on health, hygiene, nutrition and skill building opportunities. Its aim is also to enable future generations of impoverished people to break out of the poverty-enforced lack of education.

- All grants are accounted on receipt and expenditure and liabilities are accounted / recognised on accrual basis. Grants / donations received towards the 2 year end and not possible to be expended within the financial year, are treated as Advance donations and necessary applications as required under the 2.1 Income Tax rules for deferment of expenditure to the next financial year are made by the Trust.
- Grants /donations accepted / received towards implementation of various programmes for carrying out specific purposes are spent according to the direction of the donor agencies and unspent balances, if any, are dealt with in accordance with the instructions/arrangement with the donor agencies. Normally the donations are received to be spent within the financial years and they are treated as income of the year when they are received, unless they are received at the year end and treated as "Advance donation".
- Interest income is accounted on accrual basis. 2.3
- Donations specifically received towards Corpus are added to the Trust fund and are separately disclosed. 24
- Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition. 2.5
- Depreciation Depreciation on fixed assets are provided on written down value method at rates provided in the Income Tax Act, 1961. Depreciation on the Assets created out of Project funds are adjusted against the Capital Fund. 2.6
- All expenditure incurred directly towards the charitable programmes of the Trust are disclosed as "Social & Project-related Expenses" & salaries paid to 27 teachers and project staffs are disclosed as "Payment to Personnel" and all other expenditure providing support to the programmes are disclosed under "Operating and Running expenses".
- Cost of short term employee benefits are recognised on accrual basis on the terms of the employment contract and other relevant compensation policies Employee benefits followed by the Trust.
